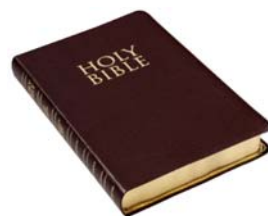

If you have ever thought about ringing handbells...

Because of several vacancies in Jubilation Ringers, handbells are not scheduled to ring in worship this fall, according to Philip Smith, Music Director. However, they are going to meet to learn music, try playing different bells, and review handbell techniques. Philip thinks this is an excellent opportunity for anyone who wants to check out handbell ringing with "zero" pressure since no ringing is scheduled this

fall. "If you've ever even *thought* about ringing handbells, now is the time to check it out," he said. The no-pressure rehearsals will be at 7:15 p.m. on Thursdays starting September 13. Let Philip know if you are interested, or just show up. If there are too many people to ring all the bells the church has, "we'll use hand chimes, too," he added.

MISSION

City's growth drives Faith in Action

The rapid growth of Georgetown is having an impact on local nonprofits, including Faith in Action Georgetown (FIAG), a mission support by FPC.

In the first half of 2018, FIAG provided 5,160 rides to almost 700 clients who needed rides to medical appointments and for shopping and personal errands. That figure is almost double what it was in 2016. Volunteers drive seniors to medical appointments locally and to Austin and Temple. Volunteers stay through the appointment and return the clients home, easing concerns that many riders have about being a burden to working family members.

"With our current volunteer base, we can transport clients a maximum of twice a week only," said FIAG Executive Director Vickie Orcutt. "Many times, an individual is managing chronic medical conditions that require multiple doctors' ap-

pointments during the week. With more volunteers, we know we could help many others who need this service."

The faith-based nonprofit, started in 2001 by Georgetown churches (including First Presbyterian), provides free transportation to homebound seniors so they can remain independent for as long as possible.

"We are extremely grateful for First Presbyterian's leadership and generous support since the inception of Faith in Action Georgetown," said Mrs. Orcutt.

To free up volunteers to provide more individual rides, FIAG recently launched a van service that takes groups of clients to the two H-E-B stores and Walmart during the week.

In addition to driving, volunteers visit homebound clients and make phone calls to those who are unable to get out. Some volunteers help in the office. Still others offer handyman services to make sure seniors can remain safe in their homes. Volunteers have flexibility in determining their schedules, where they will drive and what they are willing to do.

"We have many opportunities for volunteers to help seniors maintain a high quality of life and stay independent," said Mrs. Orcutt.



Meals on Wheels needs more volunteers

Ever thought about volunteering to deliver Meals on Wheels (MOW), but then thought we probably had enough people/drivers?

Guess what? We need more volunteer drivers. During the calendar year, volunteers from 10 churches deliver meals for a week, every 10 weeks, or about five times during the year. Our next week is October 22-26. There are 12 MOW routes. The average number of meals delivered per day is 150. Each delivery route has a three-ring binder with maps and turn-by-turn directions for each recipient's address. It also has a list of clients, their addresses and

whether they are scheduled to receive a meal that day. The volunteer is responsible for checking the list of recipients and the number of meals packed into the hot and cold bags by the Madella Hilliard Neighborhood Center staff.

Volunteers deliver from one to five days per week. They leave the center between 10:15 and 10:25 a.m.

Donations needed for TCP Food Pantry

The high summer demand for food and other items in The Caring Place Food Pantry has resulted in a drastically low inventory and a plea in August for us to donate more nonperishable donations.

This is the lowest the pantry's inventory has been in some time. Summer hit the Food Pantry hard, and often this trend continues through the holidays. Our local food drives help keep the pantry stocked, which is always a priority for TCP. The agency provides 10 days worth of food each month to families, helping families stretch their paychecks. With school starting and electricity bills high during the summer, these added expenses can cause a financial crisis for families. When pantry shelves become bare, it signals a crisis in the community, according to Director Ginna O'Connor.

July was the second busiest month in 2018 for the Food Pantry so far. The busiest was January, but it didn't hit TCP quite so hard because of the "Hunger Free Holidays Food Drive." Last year, TCP saw 722 families in July, and this year 804 families, an average of more than 38 families a day using the Food Pantry. TCP distributed almost 80,000 pounds of food in July but took in just over 10,000.

This is a wonderful time for us to pitch in and help restock The Caring Place Food Pantry. TCP always appreciates its incredible community support, but with numbers like those above, you can see why we are being asked to contribute extra food or other items this month.

Today I read an article that quoted Richard Rohr, the prolific writer and Franciscan priest, talking about "liminality"—the place betwixt and between, being on the threshold. Have you ever stood on a threshold to a new room and felt a bit disoriented?

This month is a betwixt and between—liminal spot—a threshold. As I write this article for the September issue of *First Word*, I'm feeling a bit disoriented. I'm thinking a lot about Mike's retirement and what that means for the Roberts, for the congregation and for me. I am trying to "name" what I am feeling because I've found if I can "name" something, I feel less disoriented. Like most of you, I am so very happy that Mike and Cindy are standing on the threshold of a new phase in their lives. I am also sad because I won't see them as often. The tried and true term of "anticipatory grief" just isn't fitting, it is more complex.

Then Beverly walked into my office to tell me about the book she is reading by Pauline Boss titled *Ambiguous Loss*. The word "ambiguous" popped out at me. That's it! My feelings are ambiguous! I'm happy and sad. I'm excited to see whom the Holy Spirit will call to pastor this congregation into the future. I'm grateful for the 30 years Mike and Cindy and their children have been here in Georgetown. I'm frightened of the unknown. I also have a deep heart-felt anticipation of seeing what God will do next.

It is a prickly, uncomfortable threshold of betwixt and between. We stand on that threshold together and make room for each other to be sad that things are changing. And we can love and give grace as we support each other when the "funny, prickly, strange" feeling envelopes us. We can encourage and remind each other that we are all seeking to be open and faithful and willing to be surprised by the joy Christ brings. Christ is here on the threshold with us.

LOOKING BACK OVER 30 YEARS

CALLING A MINISTER FROM CALIFORNIA was the last thing on the minds of the Pastor Nominating Committee members in 1988. We had received about 120 applications and had placed about 20 in a priority group. The rest went into a secondary group. Out-of-state applicants were generally in the secondary group primarily because we didn't feel that we could effectively evaluate individuals living long distances from Georgetown.

As we went about our evaluations, it seemed that we were struggling to find positive direction and were somewhat "going around in circles," making little progress. One night Tim Kennedy suggested we regroup and take a second look at some of the secondary applications. His idea received instant unanimous support. Gene Stump picked up the secondary stack, pulled out a name at random, held it up and suggested we "take a look at someone like this Mike Roberts person." Everyone on the committee could remember something about this California applicant from previous review.

This humble beginning led to a wonderful 30-year relationship between what at the time was a small Texas church and a young minister from California. Mike's vision and energy were precisely what our church needed. He has truly been an instrument of God's will and through his leadership we have grown and prospered in many, many ways.
